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Regular Session Courthouse November 21, 2019 6:00 P.M.

The Board met this date in regular session. Present were Chair Betsy Barfield, Commissioners Stephen Fulford, Eugene Hall, JT Surles and Stephen Walker. Also present were County Attorneys Buck Bird and Scott Shirley and Clerk of Court Kirk Reams.

- 1. Chair Barfield called the meeting order and led the invocation and pledge of allegiance.
- 2. PUBLIC HEARING: Lloyd Interchange Brownfield District
- 3. Clerk of Court Kirk Reams introduced the second hearing on the Lloyd Interchange Brownfield District and discussed the proposed resolution that would remove properties from the Lloyd Interchange Brownfield District at the request of property owners. On motion by Commissioner Walker, seconded by Commissioner Hall and unanimously carried, the Board approved resolution no. 2019-112119-01 as presented.
- 4. Chair Barfield requested that item 5c—the US-90 requested change for the mapped bicycle route through Jefferson County—be taken off the agenda to be heard at a future meeting when more information was available. On motion by Commissioner Walker, seconded by Commissioner Surles and unanimously carried, the Board approved the Consent Agenda consisting of: Approval of Agenda as amended; General Fund/Transportation Vouchers; and the minutes for 10/3/2019, 10/17/2019 and 11/7/2019 regular sessions.
- 5. Chair Barfield introduced the Multi-Use Corridor-Toll Road discussion. She introduced Rosemary Woods from M-CORS consulting, the firm hired by Florida Department of Transportation for the planning of the proposed toll road. Ms. Woods gave a Powerpoint presentation on the timeline of different phases of planning/building of the proposed toll road. Chair Barfield opened the floor for public questions and comments. The following citizens spoke in opposition of the toll road: Paul Henry; Jack Carswell; Doug Darling; Russ Thompson; Clinton Tolbert; Gordon Dean; Michelle Arceneaux; George Cole; Lynn McGrady; Dr. Seymour Rosen; Marty Wood; John Ledger; Genevieve Bennett; Steve Spencer; Susan Stubbs; PJ Narsa; Jay Frisby; Tom Randall; Richard Connell; Tony Hall; Mike Willis; Chuck Sarkisian; Daphne Wood; Floyd Faglie; Paula Barfield; Michael Schwier; Debra Taylor; Tammy Lester. The following people spoke in favor of the toll road: Franklin Brooks, Phil Calandra, Debbie Pauley. Commissioner Surles made a motion to approve a resolution requesting FDOT and the Florida Legislature consider removing Jefferson County as the terminus county for the Suncoast Connector toll road. The motion failed 2 to 3 (Barfield, Hall and Fulford opposed).
- 6. Attorney Scott Shirley introduced the Morris Petroleum 1st Amendment to the Settlement Agreement and stated we were not ready to finalize this item as he needed more time. Citizen Marcia Elder stated her concerns about the delay on this issue.
- 7. County Coordinator Parrish Barwick presented the annual housing report, including the request for a minor revision to the annual report closeout at the request of Florida Housing Finance Corporation. On motion by Commissioner Walker, seconded by Commissioner Surles and unanimously carried, the Board approved the motion to authorize exceeding the SHIP maximum of \$75,000 for the amounts noted on the revision request (\$9,427 for Swan; \$972 for Lamar).

- 8. County Coordinator Parrish Barwick presented the lease agreements for financing two Mack GR64B Dump Trucks and one Mack PI164T Day Cab Truck. On motion by Commissioner Walker seconded by Commissioner Surles and unanimously carried, the Board approved the lease agreement.
- 9. Commissioner Walker nominated Commissioner Surles to be the next Chair of the Board. By unanimous vote, Commissioner Surles was named Chair. Commissioner Fulford nominated Commission Walker to be the next Vice-Chair of the Board. By unanimous vote, Commissioner Walker was named Vice-Chair.
- 10. Citizen Paula Barfield addressed the Board about concerns on the lack of high speed internet in the Lloyd Creek/Cherry Tree Road area.
- 11. Clerk of Court Kirk Reams informed the Board that he may be applying for a federal grant for the A Building and also requested that the Board sign off on installing one or two charging stations for electric vehicles at the Courthouse parking lot. By consensus, the Board agreed to both requests.
- 12. Commissioner Hall stated the Christmas bonus for county employees item needed to be placed on the agenda for the next meeting.
- 13. On motion by Commissioner Walker, seconded by Commissioner Hall and unanimously carried, the meeting was adjourned.

This Agreement is entered into by and between the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (hereinafter "Department"), whose address is 3900 Commonwealth Boulevard, Tallahassee, Florida, and Jefferson County Board of County Commissioners (hereinafter "Participant"), whose address is 1 Courthouse Circle, Monticello, Florida, 32344 (collectively the "Parties") to perform certain site rehabilitation activities for contamination determined eligible for the Petroleum Cleanup Participation Program (hereinafter "PCPP") in accordance with Section 376.3071(13), Florida Statutes (F.S.). The contamination subject of this Agreement was reported on the following dates 12/30/1988, 09/17/1991, & 04/01/1993 at the Thompson Gas Station facility located at 1240 Jefferson Street North, Monticello, Jefferson County, Florida, ("Property") DEP Facility ID #338509757.

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 376.3071(13), F.S., the Department is authorized to provide state funding assistance at sites determined eligible for PCPP, based on the site's priority ranking established pursuant to Section 376.3071(5)(a), F.S., and Chapter 62-771, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.); and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual benefits to be derived here from, the Department and the Participant do hereby agree as follows:

GENERAL.

1. All activities associated with the performance of this Agreement shall be in conformance with the provisions of Chapter 376, F.S., and rules adopted thereunder including Chapters 62-780, 62-771, and 62-772, F.A.C.

This Agreement is effective on the date of execution by the Parties until the earlier of: (1) the Department has determined that rehabilitation is complete and issues a Site Rehabilitation Completion Order (SRCO) or Conditional Site Rehabilitation Completion Order; or (2) the funding limitations set forth in Section 376.3071(13)(b), F.S., are exhausted and site rehabilitation has not been achieved.
- 3. The Department will not expend more than \$1,200,000 on site rehabilitation, including the \$634,628.47 previously spent to date. The Department will pursue a site assessment and remediation strategy that is the most cost-effective use of state funds and is not required to pursue a more costly or aggressive remediation strategy merely because the Department has not expended funds up to or near the \$1,200,000 cap.
- 4. Per Section 197.502(8)(a), F.S. when a property escheats to the county under this subsection, the county is not subject to any liability imposed by Chapters 3769 or 403, F.S. for preexisting soil or groundwater contamination due solely to its ownership.

Therefore, Jefferson County is not responsible for the PCPP LCAR or co-payment requirements and its cost-share is \$0.00 toward the cost of the LCAR and site rehabilitation. The Department's cost share is, therefore, 100%. This provision and Agreement apply only to Jefferson County and not to any prior or subsequent owners of the Property.

COVENANTS AND REPRESENTATIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT.

- 5. If it is determined that Participant has falsely or fraudulently represented its liability to pay copayment costs or costs of the LCAR, the Department reserves the right to pursue any remedies at law or equity.
- 6. In accordance with Sections 376.3071(13), and 376.3071, F.S., and Rules 62-772.400 and 401, F.A.C., the Department will prepare scopes of work, work order, task assignments, or bids, as appropriate, with a state selected site rehabilitation contractor and the Participant may not select the site rehabilitation contractor or sub-contractors or other site rehabilitation vendors.
- 7. The Department will review and approve site rehabilitation activities in accordance with the terms of the work orders and Chapter 62-780, F.A.C., and copies of such documents will be provided to the Participant upon request or Participant may review such documents at http://dwmedms.dep.state.fl.us/Oculus/. The Participant is further advised and understands that the Department may task a locally contracted county with review of site rehabilitation documents or issuance of work orders under this Agreement.
- 8. In accordance with Sections 376.3071(13) and 287.0582, F.S., the State of Florida's performance and obligation to pay under this Agreement is contingent upon an annual appropriation by the Legislature and continued state funding shall not be deemed an entitlement or a vested right.

COVENANTS AND REPRESENTATIONS OF THE PARTICIPANT.

- 9. The Participant represents that it is qualified to enter into this Agreement and is able to fully perform its duties under this Agreement.
- 10. The Participant shall use all reasonable efforts to ensure that the necessary access for work to be performed in the implementation of this Agreement is provided to the Facility. If necessary access cannot be obtained, or if obtained, is revoked by owners or entities controlling access to the properties to which access is necessary, Participant shall notify the Department within five business days of such refusal or revocation. Failure to timely provide reasonable access to the Facility shall be considered a violation of Section 376.3071(13)(g)1., F.S., resulting in Department revoking eligibility in the PCPP and state funding for clean-up. Participant shall inform the Department at least 30 days prior to sale or transfer of the Property. Any new property owner must comply with any remaining 25% co-payment and LCAR requirements.

11. Pursuant to Sections 376.3071(4)(c), (5)(b) and (13)(b) and F.S., the Department is directed use "to the maximum extent feasible, risk-based corrective action principles to achieve protection of human health and safety and the environment in a cost-effective manner." The Department explicitly reserves the right to use, and Participant agrees to carry out and maintain, any institutional controls or combination of institutional and engineering controls allowed by Chapter 62-780, F.A.C.

TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT AND REMEDIES FOR BREACH OF AGREEMENT.

- 12. This Agreement may be terminated for material breach of obligations by either Party. Material breach means substantial failure to comply with the terms and conditions of this Agreement. A Party terminating the Agreement shall give written notice of the breach to the other Party within 14 days of discovery of facts giving rise to the breach. Such notice shall be of sufficient detail so that the Party allegedly in breach can formulate a remedy. If the breach is remedied within 15 days of the notice, the Agreement shall remain in effect. If the breach is not remedied within 15 days of the notice, the Agreement may be terminated within 15 days of the close of the 15 day remedy period. The Department may terminate this agreement without cause with notice to the Participant pursuant to paragraph 11.
- 13. The Department reserves the right to unilaterally cancel this Agreement for refusal by the Participant to allow public access to all documents, papers, letters or other material subject to the provisions of Chapter 119, F.S., and made or received by the Participant in conjunction with this Agreement.
- 14. The parties hereto agree to waive any right to jury trial under this Agreement.

NOTICES.

15. Any notice or written communication required or permitted hereunder between the Parties shall be considered delivered when posted by United States mail, delivered in person to the appropriate Party Representative or received electronically. The Department shall give reasonable notice (and not less than any notice specifically required under this Agreement) of its inspection of documents, conduct of audits, review of files, request for information, request for copies or otherwise relating to the exercise of such rights as referred to in this Agreement. 16. This Agreement shall <u>not be assigned</u> by either Party. This Agreement is not transferable; any new property owner must comply with any remaining 25% co-payment and LCAR requirements.

CHOICE OF LAW/FORUM.

17. The parties hereby agree that any and all actions or disputes arising out of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Florida; and any such actions shall be brought in Leon County, Florida.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR SITE REHABILITATION WHERE CLEANUP COSTS EXCEED SPENDING LIMITATIONS.

18. In accordance with Section 376.3071(13)(f), F.S., in the event that the funding limitations specified in Section 376.3071(13), F.S., are exhausted or exceeded prior to completion of site rehabilitation, the Participant may per 197.502(8)(b), F.S., enter into a separate written agreement for the performance and funding of investigative and remedial acts necessary for the property to achieve a closure under Chapter 62-780, F.A.C. If the Participant fails to either timely continue the site rehabilitation activities or enter into a separate written agreement with the Department, the Department and its contractor(s) are permitted to continue performing assessment and remedial activities that the Department, at its sole discretion, deems appropriate. The Department will designate its own contractor(s) to undertake site rehabilitation actions without the approval of the Participant or any other responsible party. As such, the Department, at its sole discretion, may choose to undertake assessment or cleanup activities that are less stringent than the requirements of Chapters 62-780 and 62-777, F.A.C., and which may not result in the issuance of a Site Rehabilitation Completion Order with or without conditions.

19. Reserved.

COST RECOVERY FOR LCAR AND CO-PAYMENT COSTS INITIALLY WAIVED

20. Reserved.

ENTIRE AGREEMENT.

21. It is hereby understood and agreed that this Agreement states the entire agreement and that the Parties are not bound by any stipulations, representations, agreements or promises, oral or otherwise, not printed in this Agreement.

Urban Catalyst Consultants, Inc has submitted a modification to the existing site plan on behalf of Trulieve Inc.. Trulieve will be adding an additional 6 buildings, four that will be 24,000sqft and two 46,000sqft. They are also adding a 8,400sqft storage building, a 5,000sqft reverse osmosis building, and a Duke-Energy substation will also be added to power the facility. The additional buildings for Trulieve Inc. are still consistent with the standards of the Jefferson County Land Development Code. It is my recommendation that the modification to the existing site plan be approved.
